Internal rules relating to confidentiality in anti-doping

Article 1: Scope of Application

The present rules are applicable to all DC members, as currently defined under Article 11.2 a) to f) of the IAF Statutes, and to any officer and/or person entrusted by the DC with decision-making power or other mission relating to anti-doping and data privacy (hereafter individually referred to as a “**Person**”).

Article 2: Involvement in doping control

In accordance with Article 20.3.5 of the WADA Code, and subject to applicable law, the IAF shall not employ a Person in any position involving doping control who is provisionally suspended or is serving a period of ineligibility under the WADA Code or who has directly and intentionally engaged in conduct within the previous six (6) years which would have constituted a violation of anti-doping rules.

Article 3: Confidentiality

“**Confidential Information**” means any information and data relating to an individual, which is disclosed to the IAF in relation to applicable anti-doping rules or policies.

Any Person processing Confidential Information is subject to a duty of confidentiality, meaning that this Person shall:

- (i) only access and/or use the Confidential Information or any part of it for the purpose of anti-doping enforcement in accordance with WADA and IAF rules;
- (ii) protect the confidentiality of the Confidential Information
- (iii) not, at any time, without the prior written consent of the Company, disclose or reveal the Confidential Information to any other person whatsoever, other than to another Person or authorized body (including but not limited to WADA and ITA).

Notwithstanding any of the other provisions hereof, the Person shall not be liable for release or disclosure of any Confidential Information that:

- (i) is or becomes part of the public domain through no fault of the Person;
- (ii) must be disclosed as required by applicable law, or regulation, or order of a court of competent jurisdiction, government department, or any other operation of law, or is necessary to seek to establish a defence in any legal or regulatory proceeding or investigation.
